2767	Dot Lovell-Smith			<p>I have thought long and hard about the proposed new library service centre and recreation facilities</p> <p>I think the centre should be 2 separate complexes.</p> <p>Library and Customer Services</p> <p>My choice would be for the Library Service Centre to be built opposite Hornby 1-13 school on the corner of Smarts and Waterloo Rd It is close to the schools in the area and is easily accessible by foot, bike and car. Bus routes could be changed to include Smarts Rd or a new Waterloo Rd service introduced. It could become a valuable homework resource for the local schools. The library should be similar in size and purpose to the Upper Riccarton with rooms available for community use during the day and in the evening. A two storey building could be attractive and have a smaller land footprint.</p> <p>The surrounding area could be landscaped to include gardens, shelter for sitting and picnic spaces, a paddling pool/ water area and an interesting playground for children with adventure challenges.</p> <p>I know this site would need extensive remediation as it is an old landfill, but remediation work will need to be done at some stage if Hornby is to be developed as an attractive place to live in the future. So why not now!</p> <p>South West Leisure Centre</p> <p>The best site for the recreation site would be the old Sockburn school site. It is easily accessible from Springs Rd, Main South Rd and Garvins Rd and has the room to include playing fields that would replace those lost in Kyle Park through the library build. It also has the room to build hard courts and an indoor sports and meeting complex similar to the Lincoln Events centre. There is room for an early child hood centre. The land could be planted so that an attractive park like atmosphere is established as an antidote to the frenetic traffic that is a feature of Hornby. Cycleways could link with the motorway cyclepath and the Wigram swales and cycle tracks.</p> <p>Your Consultation Document mentions an elevated crime rate in this area, but is it surprising? We have at least 8 liquor outlets, and multiple fast food outlets with all the problems of rubbish and hyperactivity that these places generate.</p> <p>(Pak n Save, Countdown, Liquor shops in Carmen Rd, Goulding Av, and the Hub; Pokie bars on Goulding Ave, Chalmers St, and Tower Street, The Working Mens Club and MSA Inc).</p> <p>The parks in Hornby are not maintained well and broken glass and litter often build up on paths and around bins. The asbestos contamination area has been fenced off and the area now appears to be an experimental site for watching the process of plant regeneration through windblown and bird-spread seed or maybe its an art installation showing the way paper and plastic rubbish breaks down over time when left to drift into a wild plant area. Whatever, there is no notice posted telling us, the residents who walk past it daily, what the Council's plans are for this area.</p> <p>Paths through parks and footpaths around the shops are badly planned; too narrow ( near Macdonalds), non existent ( near Countdown) and often in bad repair with lumps, bumps and hollows that turn into puddles, and used as carparking (the path to the tunnel under the railway line).</p> <p>Hornby is also the closest suburb to the Canterbury prisons.</p> <p>Hornby deserves a bit of time and money spent on it to get the best possible facility. Good on you for dedicating some effort to getting this project moving. I have lived in Hei Hei for 25 years and worked in local schools. I have been continually saddened and frustrated by watching bored children cut off by financial constraints, family circumstance and geography from the advantages other Christchurch children enjoy. The lack of beautiful gardens and care for our recreation spaces tells us all we are worthless and don't deserve the best.</p> <p>It's now time for Hornby to become the place everybody wants to visit and live in instead of the dumping ground for rubbish tips, poor people, traffic problems, fast food outlets and shopping barns.</p> <p>I know its not in the brief for this submission, but I also think the council should acquire some land for future recreation purposes in the Waterloo Islington Square subdivision. It could just be a flat, green, attractive space where workers and locals could walk, run, eat their lunch play touch/football and just chill out. We all need to be thinking healthy life styles. We all need forward thinking and planning to make the South West an even more fantastic place in the future. Approach some of our local building, demolition and roading millionaires for some money and sponsorship. Use local working bees for the enhancement and playground development. Think creatively.</p> <p>And come to Hornby. Get out of your cars, walk the footpaths and the parks. Imagine you are a young mum with a push chair going shopping, or a dad looking for some way to entertain the children and get them away from the tele screen. Imagine you want to get together somewhere safe with your teenage mates, Imagine you are 70 and want a sheltered spot to sit in the fresh air or take your dog for a walk.</p> <p>Imagine that between the Warehouse complex and the Hub there is a green plaza with a fountain and gardens and paths linking the 2 centres. With just a few parking spaces for the disabled and the pregnant mums. But don't worry there is a 5 story carpark over by the railway line near the Hornby Railway station for park and ride commuters and shoppers, and charging stations for electric cars and very frequent buses pulling up to the smoke free shelters to whisk us home.</p> <p>Imagine the future.</p>

The many different sports clubs that use Denton Park work well together, please don't take that away from our Community.</p>
2738	David Chamberlain			<p>After reading the consultation document and visiting each of the sites I believe that the Sockburn School site is the best option for this new facility.</p> <p>Reasons for my decision:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. The site has access from two major arterial routes being Main South Road which would give good left in left out access to the site, and Springs Road which has a much wider frontage. This would allow a second access to the facilities and reduce traffic congestion similar to that which would occur at Denton Park. I don't see any barriers to walking or cycling from the south or west as much of this traffic would come from or through Wigram Skyes subdivision.</li> <li>2. Public transport links are good with bus stops on both roads close to the site. Some of the busses could even go through the hub if that was thought necessary.</li> <li>3. The close proximity to the Upper Riccarton Library I see as an opportunity to amalgamate both library facilities and look to the future of building a new library in the Masham area. Planning for this new library should be starting now so that when it is needed in the next 5 to 10 years it will be ready to go.</li> <li>4. Using this excellent location would mean that you wouldn't be jamming this facility into an extremely congested central Hornby. I don't see it as being relatively isolated.</li> <li>5. I see the demolition of the structures as an opportunity to recover the materials with the disposal of concrete being the only major cost. However this is approached the demolition costs should be a deduction from the purchase price. I could also see one of the existing buildings being used as a Menz Shed and I understand that the major stumbling block to a Shed being established in Hornby is the land on which to build it. Something to add to your co-location.</li> <li>6. If you build an excellent facility then the low profile you mention from Main South Road won't be an issue as people won't mind travelling to it. This is a golden opportunity to build a 50 swimming pool in the South West to cater for the future growth of the area and create a multi sport complex. Sports like water polo, under water hockey, diving, jazz-a size and lane swimming can all co-exist in this pool for a much healthier population.</li> <li>7. I don't see the larger sit as an empty glass as shown in the consultation document. I see it as the glass being half full and waiting for it to be overflowing with new ideas of what could go onto this site. I have already mentioned a Menz Shed now is the opportunity to include social housing. These are ideal co-location facilities to be included with this complex.8. Again the document mentions the difficulties of land purchase impacting on the timing. Again I see this as a glass half full waiting for the challenge to be taken up. When looking at your preferred areas, Denton Park requires demolition of the grandstand and other old sheds and it requires site drilling to determine the stability of the foundations, Kyle Park requires site drilling to determine the stability of the foundations and a substantial amount of old dump materials to be removed before work can start, Warren Park will requires site drilling to determine the stability of the foundations and a substantial roading project would be needed before work starts. So buying new land isn't an issue. Indeed it is the right thing to do so let's get on with the process.</li> </ol> <p><b>Don't use Denton Park</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. It is not possible to create a civic heart in a community which is separated by two State Highways and a main trunk railway line. You cannot create a civic heart if that heart is jammed between a railway line with no access and the main state highway where access if restricted to just one point on State Highway No. 1.</li> <li>2. You cannot say that this site has high profile visibility when it cannot be built on the road frontage. Because of the lack of road frontage this building will have to be built well back off the State Highway No1 (SH No1).</li> <li>3. Yes you do have a significant land area here to build the South West Leisure Centre but at what cost? It will remove the main rugby ground and the grandstand. It will also destroy the main full size cricket pitch in Hornby by reducing the size of the boundaries. This is what happened at Jade Stadium and cricket had to move to Hagley park. Will you put another full size cricket pitch on Hagley Park to replace this one? Much of the land taken will be for car parking which you also plan to distribute around the ground in order to provide sufficient parking. Will people have to walk across the rugby ground and cricket pitch just to get to the library or go for a swim.</li> <li>4. Using Denton Park is reducing the rugby grounds from two at present to one and it is destroying the main cricket pitch by reducing the boundaries. This will result in increased costs for the project to complete these changes and upgrades.</li> </ol>

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2738 contd				<p>5. I am surprised that this document has been released without any investigation into the ground conditions. Core samples should have been obtained and the results included in this document so that proper consultation could take place in an informed way.</p> <p>6. Changing the Recreation Reserve will not be a simple task and will require further consultation, time and costs. Then of course there is the Management Plan which will have to be changed as well as more consultation, time and costs added to the project.</p> <p>7. I understand NZ Land Transports specific interests in the building of this project in such a contested area of high volume national road SH No.1. This document does not explain how you are going to provide a new primary and secondary road access. Indeed it is basically impossible to achieve this unless you purchase houses for this specific purpose. It is currently impossible for vehicles to access motels near the entrance to Denton Park heading south on SH No.1. Now you want to build a major facility right beside the motel and about 100m from MacDonalds. I understand NZTA's frustration at your proposal and I will be supporting them in objecting to access being granted off a very congested SH No.1.</p> <p>8. Denton Park appears to be the preferred option of Council staff for this project. This is absolute madness and should be opposed by Council</p> <p><b>Don't use Kyle Park</b></p> <p>1. I agree that Kyle Park is in a general proximity to the centre of Hornby and would integrate well with some of the schools in the area. It would have been suitable for this project even though like Denton Park it would not be directly connected to the Hornby Mall.</p> <p>2. It has an extensive road frontage which would allow good visibility and there is sufficient land available for the new centre.</p> <p>3. Like Denton Park using this ground will destroy the cricket pitch and while this is not of the quality of Denton Park it is still well used.</p> <p>4. Again I am surprised that this document has been released without any investigation into the ground conditions. Core samples should have been obtained and the results included in this document so that proper consultation could take place in an informed way.</p> <p>5. The land is Council owned and this would save money but knowing that it is a dump site no consideration has been given to the cost of cleaning it up. Staff advised that the site would have to be excavated to at least 10 metres deep and all contents removed. But they had no idea of the costs. Site drilling of the whole area would have determined the depth, the volume and the costs of the material to be removed. As submitters we have had better advice on this problem.6. If this site is chosen then a better solution may be to pile the area needed for buildings and put in a rib-raft foundation.</p> <p>7. Traffic congestion may be a problem at certain times of the day, particularly at Waterloo Road and SH No1 intersection (Carmen Road). But in saying this I still believe there will be fewer problems with traffic than there will be at Denton Park.</p> <p>8. Again changing the Recreation Reserve status will not be a simple task and will require further consultation, time and costs. Then of course there is the Management Plan which will have to be changed as well more consultation, time and costs added to the project. Also the BMX Club will need to be excluded from any buildings or other changes which may destroy their activities.</p> <p><b>Don't use Warren Park</b></p> <p>1. Warren Park has some very good features which do need to be considered when thinking about its use for this project. It has low vehicle congestion and NZTA are unlikely to oppose it as they would the use of Denton Park. While it lacks visual presence there is sufficient land which is Council owned.</p> <p>2. But again I am surprised that this document has been released without any investigation into the ground conditions. Core samples should have been obtained and the results included in this document so that proper consultation could take place in an informed way. You don't know if this land will support the weight of these buildings.</p> <p>3. While it is believed that the use of Warren Park will provide an opportunity for increased community activities the 8000m required for this project will remove two football fields to achieve that goal. By removing these two football fields enormous pressure will be put on the Clubs to provide for their games. As this is the main football field in the South West area it is used by both Hornby and Halswell Clubs especially when the Halswell fields are too wet to be played on. Removal of the football fields will also destroy two cricket pitches. Therefore it is unlikely that more community activities will take place as suggested.</p>

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2738 contd				<p>4. A civic heart could be built anywhere it does not have to be beside a highly congested shopping mall.</p> <p>5. Public transport, connectivity and pedestrian traffic are items which are hampered but can be remedied.</p> <p><b>Conclusion</b></p> <p>Don't build on existing Council owned Reserve Land with all their unidentified problems and time frame disruptions as mentioned above.</p> <p>The only sensible option is to purchase the Sockburn School site and build an exciting new facility nearer to the heart of the South West, with good existing road access, away from traffic congestion, free of old dump sites, ready to be built on in the same time frame as other sites, more area for other sports and a once in a life time opportunity to build a 50 metre multisport water complex in the South West.</p>

2610	Christine Parker			As the kitchen is the heart of the home, I believe the library and pool facility is the heart of the community. It's a place where people come together; a safe place to meet and spend time instead of people feeling the only place to go is to the Hub. Let's have a cafe as well!  Although there are a lot of older people in the area, Hornby is a changing environment with a lot of younger families moving to a more affordable part of the city. I believe that the young and old should mingle, and by having the amenities under one roof this will happen. Older people get isolated as their friends and partners die, so it is important for the mental well-being of the older people that they interact with the younger generation, and vice versa.  Currently Denton Park is used on some evenings for sports practise and on the occasional Saturday (and Sunday in summer). It would be put to much better use for amenities where it can be used daily by a much wider group of the community.  Denton Park is something of a rubbish dump after sports games/practises and I will be happy to see the sports facilities moved to one site (Kyle Park - opposite the primary and high school) with more rubbish bins available. Denton Park is also used as a toilet where there are bushes by the velodrome. We need to raise the bar in Hornby so such practices are stopped and with a lot of people visiting the amenities I believe this would achieve that. I would also like to see the rugby club moved to Kyle Park. I use the walkway between Kathleen Crescent and the Hub and there is often broken glass along the footpath and also outside the club rooms following weekend matches.  The current playground consists of a seesaw and 2 or 3 swings. While we're spending some long overdue money in Hornby - I've been paying rates here for 10 years and the only improvement I have seen is better lighting along the Denton Park walkway, but this is more for safety and security - can we please have a decent playground for the children; something exciting and new - check out the playgrounds at Selwyn. And while we are at it, how about some equipment for adults as we also like to have a swing, a ride on a merry go round, and play on the seesaw with children. Also, an outdoor exercise area - check out the parks at Prebbleton and Lincoln. If there is a problem about obesity, let's do something about it at Council level - you have these in other areas.  For all of this to happen, the traffic flow needs to be carefully considered. With the 4 lane SH 1 running alongside Denton Park, McDonalds on one corner, a service station on another, and the Hub on another, the bus exchange located at the Hub, and car parking on the roof, at the rear and at the front of the Hub, and no green arrows on the traffic lights for traffic departing the Hub, there is often congestion and this does need to be addressed so traffic flows safely.  Please make the erection of our new facility a priority and don't sharpen the pencil. There are so few amenities for the residents here; Hornby is way overdue for new facilities and I think the library/pool/service centre should only be the starting point taking into consideration these amenities will service Hornby, Islington, Hei Hei, Broomfield, Sockburn, Wigram and Templeton.

The Hornby Cricket Club was established in 1961/62 Season and in the past 55 years have developed 2 cricket blocks, modern and sizeable clubrooms, practice facilities and a storage shed with a replacement cost in excess of \$500,000. The use of these facilities would be seriously jeopardised by this proposal as our playing facilities would be reduced by 50% i.e. 1 wicket block impacting our ability to deliver quality cricket facilities for our members.</li> <li>2. The loss of playing fields and the reduction to only 1 wicket block would significantly affect our lower grade teams opportunity to play home games and would mean that 3 of our 4 teams would play away each week.</li> <li>3. It could also mean the loss of our senior status for this ground if the remaining wicket block is located within a rugby field seriously impacting on the use of our clubroom facilities</li> <li>4. The proposal would also add considerable additional cost to the club as the club would have to pay for 1 full prepared wicket from the Council each year as it is not able to shift the roller and mowers each week to another park to prepare a wicket elsewhere losing the efficiency of our current operation.</li> <li>5. The loss of 1 wicket block could eventually see the demise of our Club as the additional costs and only 1 team using the clubrooms each week would significantly impact the viability of the club. The Christchurch Metropolitan Cricket Association is also concerned about the loss of another cricket wicket as there is already a shortage of club prepared grass wickets.</li> <li>6. Denton Park is also the home for the Hornby Rugby Club and their operation would also be significantly affected by this proposal as it would mean the loss of 1 training and playing field and have a major impact on their junior club members as there would not be enough space for their teams to play on Saturdays. The Club also has their clubrooms on the park as well and a reduction in teams playing at Denton Park on Saturdays would affect their bar operation and have a direct impact on the finances of their club.</li> <li>7. Our club is very critical of the Councils consultation on this proposal as we have had only 2 meetings with Council Staff and have yet to see any site plan showing the location of the proposed facility on the park after numerous requests making analysis of the proposal difficult. We have had to calculate the real impact on the park of the Councils proposal, as this information has been deliberately withheld. The consultation documentation does not advise of the area of land required for the proposed facilities, either separately or combined. See our plan of the sporting fields attached.</li> <li>8. The Council has shown a lack of understanding of how the Cricket Club, Rugby Club, and other users make use of the park and the benefits we provide to the community.</li> <li>9. The consultation document also is misrepresenting the impact on the park and its users by stating that the proposed development would only occupy 11% of the park. The 11% reflects the total reserve site including the oval and the water reservoir and waste space between the oval and the railway line and carparking. The actual loss of sports fields is in fact 33% or 1/3 of the playing fields which is significant to the users. This matter was pointed out to the Council staff prior to the printing of the consultation documentation but was still included in this manner.</li> <li>10. If the development of Denton Park was to proceed, our clubs view would be that we are significantly compromised in our operation and that a full relocation to another local sports ground and reinstatement of our facilities would be the only satisfactory option.</li> <li>11. The Councils Proposal referred to traffic issues around Hornby Mall. These issues will only be compounded by the proposed development and would add significant additional cost to the project to resolve these matters need to be fully taken into consideration when making this decision. Expert advice in accessibility combined with quality consultation with the disability sector would ensure this occurs.  Creating an accessible facility such as this community library / leisure centre means that disabled people, older adults, families with pushchairs, people with temporary injuries and tourists to the city can all access and use this facility safely and with ease.

This has long been needed in the community, especially with the increase in people moving to this area since the 2011 Canterbury earthquakes.</p> <p>Citizens Advice Bureau has had a branch located in the Hornby area since 1978. As such we would like to offer our unique perspective as a community organisation that serves this local area.</p> <p>1. Our preference is for a co-located facility the aquatic facility, library and customer service centre to be co-located on one site. Increasingly we are hearing from our clients that they are interested in a one stop shop that is, being able to access multiple services at one location. A co-located facility offers the greatest potential for good synergy between the commercial aspects of Hornby and the social aspects of a new library, service centre and recreational centre. The two different areas would feed off each other in terms of clientele base. Citizens Advice Bureau is already co-located within four Christchurch City Council libraries and customer service centres:</p> <p>CAB Hornby</p> <p>CAB Fendalton</p> <p>CAB satellite service at South Library•</p>

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				<p>CAB satellite service at Linwood Library</p> <p>We would like to add value to the new co-located facility and would ask would it be possible for Council to consider setting aside 50 square metres for offices for Citizens Advice Bureau? Currently, our Hornby Branch provides Justice of the Peace clinics on a Monday and Thursday 9.30-1.30 and Free Legal Advice clinic on a Thursday evening from 6.15pm. We would make these clinics available at the new site if office space was set aside for our organisation.</p> <p>Therefore, from our perspective a co-located facility has the greatest potential for engaging the local community and creating greater value than two separate facilities. Denton Park is the preferred option in terms of location of the facility</p> <p>The reason for Denton Park as our first choice option is because it is centrally located and easy to access in terms of transportation links. Denton Park is on the existing main transportation route in Hornby. It is less than two minutes walk from the Hub Hornby mall and less than three minutes walk from Dressmart.</p> <p>Kyle Park would require significant investment in terms of land remediation and accessibility to the site is currently difficult. Warren Park is a good site. However, it is difficult to access in terms of public transport and it is a significant walk (40 minutes from the Hub Hornby), parking could also be an issue at this site as it would impact on the residential feel and flavour of the surrounding streets.</p> <p>We would also ask Council to consider the nature of the local community.</p> <p>Hornby is not a homogenous area. It can be divided into three smaller areas, each has its own unique character. The three areas are as follows;</p> <p>Hei Hei Broomfield. This area tends to be dominated by Housing New Zealand houses and most of the population residing in this area are from low socio-economic backgrounds. This population base tends to have high needs in terms of requiring support from local community organisations.</p> <p>Hornby Central. This area is characterised by residents who work mainly in the industries located in the Hornby area such as transportation, distribution and processing factories for example Tegel. It is also characterised by former Airforce houses which were used to house military staff.</p> <p>Wigram/Awatea Road Residential developments. Many houses in this area sell for \$500,000 plus. Residents living in this area come from a more diverse background in terms of ethnicity and often tend to be new arrivals, having moved to the area after the Canterbury earthquakes. Some state that they feel disconnected from the wider Hornby community.</p> <p>While we respect and understand that council aims to provide its service to people from all walks of life and backgrounds we would ask you to consider Denton Park as the primary location for the following reasons in terms of meeting the diverse needs of the different groups.</p> <p>Hei Hei/Broomfield residents face financial constraints due to being on fixed limited incomes, not all residents in this area have access to a vehicle and a 40 minute walk to access a co-located facility would be a significant barrier.</p> <p>Central Hornby residents are mainly from working class backgrounds. This means that they would need to access the facility either before or after work or in the weekends. Ease of access to the facility then becomes an important factor in usage rates for this group. Increased travel time to a site that isn't conveniently located could become a barrier for this group.</p> <p>Wigram/Awatea residents have the financial capacity to travel to the Denton Park site. The central location of the facility would enable this group to feel more socially connected to the wider Hornby area.</p> <p>Summary</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1.
