FUNDING OPTIONS FOR COMMUNITY GROUPS 2024/25

Available Grants and Funds

CHRISTCHURCH CITY COUNCIL - www.ccc.govt.nz

- Strengthening Communities Fund (SCF)
 - For NGOs, divided into Metropolitan and Community Board funds
 - Opens early March and closes mid-April.
 - Applicants notified of decision by early September.
- Discretionary Response Fund (DRF)
 - For NGOs, divided into Metropolitan and Community Board funds
 - Open year round and closes when funds are expended.
 - Funding period is for 12 months after date of grant
- Creative Communities
 - Provides funding for local arts activities. Supports a wide range of projects and different art forms.
 - Round Two opens mid-January and closes late February each year.
 - Round One opens July and closes September each year.
- Community Organisation Loans Scheme
 - Capital funding only
- Events and Festivals Sponsorship Fund
 - Provides sponsorship and support for larger metropolitan events that enhance regional and local Christchurch as a place to live and visit and to strengthen the distinctive lifestyle, qualities, and identity of Christchurch.
 - One funding round per year- applications open February/March, with final decisions made in June for events taking place 1 July to 30 June financial year.
 - The minimum amount granted through this fund is \$5,000. There is no maximum amount an event organiser can apply for; however, it is the Council's preference to provide sponsorship support in conjunction with other funding providers.
 - Past recipients include Coca-Cola Christmas in the Park, Diwali, Christchurch Holi
 Festival, Christchurch Marathon
- Events Seeding Fund
 - A small sponsorship fund designed to provide one-off support towards the establishment of new events being hosted in the city, or to support significant directional changes to existing events.
 - Applications can be received at any time throughout the year until the fund is exhausted. The financial year for this fund runs from 1 July to 30 June.
 - Previous recipients include Two Minds Festival, Electric Avenue, Off Centre Festival
- Small Sports Events Fund
 - The fund provides opportunities to National and South Island sporting events.
 - The fund is open to sports associations, clubs or event managers who may make more than one application per funding round as long as each application is for a separate event.
 - One funding round per year- applications open April, with final decisions made in June for events taking place 1 July to 30 June financial year.

■ The Foundation distributes funds in line with their purpose of being a catalyst for building of strong, connected, healthy, happy and prosperous communities with the focus on four key funding areas of: Learn, Support, Connect, Participate and sustain.

Small Grants Programme

- Requests for \$20,000 or less
- Open year round
- Only allowed to apply once a year
- Average decision time is ten weeks after application

Large Grants Programme

- Requests over \$20,000
- Open year round
- Only allowed to apply once a year
- Average decision time is four months after application

Building Projects

Applications over \$100,000 required to submit an Expression of Interest by 1 June.

NGÄI TAHU FUND - http://ngaitahu.iwi.nz

 Once a year tribal members and groups of members can apply for funding for projects designed to meet specific cultural objectives, including building cultural knowledge, encouraging cultural practices and leadership. Applications open 1 July and close 30 September 2021.

WAYNE FRANCIS CHARITABLE TRUST - www.wfct.org.nz

• This philanthropic family organisation is primarily focused on young people aged 0 to 25 and cancer research in the Christchurch area.

SARGOOD BEQUEST - www.sargoodbequest.org.nz

■ The trust makes grants to projects and activities in the areas of children and youth, cultural, sports and outdoors, education and environment with a focus on access, participation and inspiration. The fund closes on 31 December annually and has an upper limit of \$5,000. Grants are paid out in May each year.

THE JR MCKENZIE TRUST - www.irmckenzie.org.nz

A philanthropic trust which provides grants to community organisations throughout New Zealand. Their main focus areas are Māori development and disadvantaged children and their families. Applications with a focus on other especially marginalised groups may also be considered.

■ The Lion Foundation is a gaming trust. Funding is shared between the areas of community which includes sport (40%), community, arts and culture (30%), health (15%), and education (15%). The Lion Foundation receives applications year round and the grants committee meets monthly with the exception of January. One application a year.
